FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK




Welcome back to all dancers:

From Behind the Microphone by Terry Hebert

Because of an interest by some readers, the idea of a column by callers was requested, so we are going to experiment with this for a bit and see where it may lead. The opinions expressed within this column are those of the writer.

Why Squares Break Down

During a recent Callerlab convention, my lovely wife attended the session on, "Why Squares Break Down". Within the session, they talked about how callers and dancers can adjust to problematic places or scenarios within a dance.

One of the first things we were taught, when I took dancer lessons some years ago, many have probably forgotten. Here is a key element my wife brings up all the time. When your square breaks down, FORM A LINE – ANY KIND OF LINE! A line is the universal sign to the caller that you have broken down and are waiting to get back into dancing again. The easiest way to form that line, is to square up at home and the head couples back over to their right to stand beside the sides in a line. The caller will then work everyone back into dancing. If, for some reason, the caller does not, then at least if he calls an Allemande left you are next to your corner.

There are two general reasons why a square breaks down and this can be divided into two general categories: Hall issues and dancer skill issues. Hall issues give us three general problem areas: the floor surface is sticky or slick, the floor could be crowded (a good problem to have) and dancers can't hear! Bill Clarke always said to me, "Once I lost all my marbles, dancers would be able to hear me clearly". Halls with terrible acoustics can be managed. The worse the acoustics are in a hall, the more your music needs to be brought down against the voice. Being heard clearly enough for the dancers to execute the call successfully is the most important. Being heard can always be a challenge. Noise from people chatting on the side lines can overtake the dance floor. Talking, while dancing in the square, is by far a major contributor to why squares break down.

Dancers need to know at which level they can dance comfortably. Sometimes dancing at a level higher than the one the dancers are proficient in, can cause breakdowns and, as well, can cause dancers to become discouraged and set themselves up for failure. Sometimes we have to take a step back and re-evaluate where we are most comfortable dancing.

We, as callers, are ultimately responsible for the dancers' success or failure. If we call too fast, too hard, or have not great clarity in our deliverance, the dancers will struggle and eventually squares will fail. If we think about it, to correct it, Is just as easy; slow down, ease up and adjust the music down or the sound of the microphone. Now by far, this is not always the cause of squares breaking down. For 50% of the time, give or take, the dancers we are calling to are just not ready for the material we are presenting to them. We have to ease them into it, not just slap them with it without warning. I warn dancers when something is coming. I will also build them up to it. It is a scaffold effect; let them climb up gradually, not push them from the top and hope they float through with ease.

Dancers, please always take hands and commit to what just took place, whether it be right or wrong. To me, commit is a reminder to a dancer to do something, not just stand there or drift apart. Having them take an action, again be it right or wrong, is better than doing nothing at all.

Dancers, if you struggle, come up and ask for assistance from your caller. They are there to help you in any way they can. At the end of the night, we as callers are ultimately there for your enjoyment and if we don't do our jobs properly, then we have failed you as our customer, our dancer and our friend.

Have fun and don't get discouraged. Think of some of the remarks that were made from behind the microphone; see where we can all improve and help make our activity an enjoyable event for all!

Town and Country Squares Celebrate Hebert's 20 Years as Caller

How fortunate it was that on a Friday the 13th 1998, Town and Country Squares decided to hire the young Terry Hebert as official Club Caller. So, on April 13th, the square dance club held a surprise celebration at Christ Church Hall in St. Stephen to honor the 20 years of dedicated service that the now internationally-renowned square dance caller Terry Hebert has provided for the club.

Thelma Mundie from DeWolfe, one of the original members of Town and Country Squares that began 43 years ago, said that when Terry Hebert first started calling in St. Stephen, "He was very young and it was always fun because he put life in it. He's got rhythm." Of course, it's still fun. His clear, rich tenor, singing and calling voice makes it pleasant and easy to hear and understand the calls. He keeps the rhythm upbeat and fast except for beginners. He is constantly learning and creating original call patterns that keep both young and not so young dancers on their toes.

Mrs. Mundie also spoke of his dedication to the Town and Country Squares Club. "He gets here every week through snow storms and rain." Past President, Frank McCullum from Beaver Harbour, agreed, stating, "Terry would travel down from Fredericton every week. Lots of times, I wouldn't be on the roads at all, but he'd still manage to get here." Callers and square dancers at this surprise celebration were from all over New Brunswick, including Woodstock, Fredericton, Oromocto, Cambridge Narrows, Saint John, and Sussex as well as people from Maine. The square dance floor was full to capacity with eight dance squares (32 dancers) and many more sitting about watching when Terry Hebert began calling.

At the celebration was Ron Lowe from Quispamsis, a popular Maritime square dance caller, who told me a bit about Terry Hebert's experience. "Terry began at age 13 under the tutorship of Bill Clark, a caller in Fredericton, 30 years ago." He added that Terry is currently involved with various provincial, national and international organizations. "He is Past Chairman of the Maritime Callers and Cuers Association: Chairman of the Federation of Dance Clubs of NB; and he's been training callers and cuers in NB and PEL Currently, he is a member of both the National and International Square Dance Callers Associations." He explained that Terry is an active member of Caller Lab, an American square dance callers association that has members from around the world, and participates on several of its committees. He added that, "Terry is also a capable round dance cuer and leader. He is always willing to help callers learning to call and willing to take on jobs and help people out. He says, 'I'll do it; I'll look after it.' That's his attitude. He is well liked and loved by all the other leaders and callers. I think the world of him. He's like a third son.

Another guest at the celebration was the well-known, former radio broadcaster Bill Scott from Fredericton, who said, "I've known Terry for approximately 20-odd years but I've only been square dancing for 8 years. Right now, we [he and Terry] are teaching kids between the ages of kindergarten to grade 5 how to square dance in Cambridge Narrows."

After receiving his recognition award for his twenty years of service to the Town and Country Squares Club, Terry Hebert spoke to the audience about how he started calling for this club in St. Stephen when he was 23 years old, "On Friday the 13th one February, I walked into this building for the very first time. I can remember that Vince and Olive [Clark] and Mel and Barb [Weeks, Co-Presidents of the Club] were sitting in the front corner. Back then, there was the elite team that you had to make an impression on, but I didn't know that. So, I called the dance that night. During the last tip [dance] of the night, my mom [Margaret Hebert] went over and switched the lights off

because it was a black cat dance on a Friday [the 13th]. When we got in the car that night and were heading home, she says, Well, what do you think happened there?' Well, we probably won't be called back after that stunt. We came back down the next week. We set up and called, and all went well. Then Olive [Clark] looked me up and down, and looked me up and down. 'Yep,' she said, 'Well, you're not bad for the first couple of nights.' I thought, 'That was not good.' Then in May, the club decided it was desperate enough to ask me to call here, and that was that."

He explained that several other callers had been asked to call for the Town and Country Squares that year while they were deciding which one would become the official caller for the club. Terry continued, "I came down one Friday night with Bev and Jerry O'Hare [by car]. The dance that night was at the St. Stephen Pythian Hall. I kind of knew I was going to be caller here. In the back of Jerry O'Hare's mind, he was sure it was going to be his. So, Jerry is calling away and I'm sitting behind the bingo machine not saying anything. Barb [Weeks] comes over and says, 'We're going to tell the club tonight that you are going to be the Club Caller.' 'Barb! It's going to be a long walk home. Can we wait?" 'No!,' she says, 'It's tonight.' Well I said, do what you have to do. I stayed behind the bingo machine because I figured that's the safest spot to be. All of a sudden, she announces that the club decided that I would be the Club Caller. Jerry turns around to me and says, 'You know, it's a long... damn... walk home don't you?" 'Yes Jerry, I'm well aware.' After a half hour of convincing from Bev - thank God for Bey - he allowed us to get back in the car for home. It's hard to believe it's been 20 years. It's flown by so fast. I thank you all for very much for coming out tonight. It certainly was a surprise and thank you very much for these 20 wonderful years down here."



This couple despite health issues over the years have continued to dance each week. They currently are members of their home club Elm Tree Squares and recently became members of Washademoak Swingers in Cambridge Narrows in which they carpool with another couple each week to make the trek to Cambridge Narrows. This couple also was on the committee to help describe the duties and constitution of the Washademoak Swingers club recently.

Dancing and good music is in their bones. This couple when not square dancing can be seen around Minto on the occasional Friday night to the Seniors Dances, they can be seen attending live music in Fredericton at Where Rivers Meet or even the Pure Country Show. Even the weekly jam sessions around the area you might see one or both of them there tapping their toes and singing along.

Distinguished Service Awards Recipients

LES & ROSE CAROLYN SMITH

This couple started dancing in the early 70's, while the rage to dance was just beginning in the Fredericton area with so few clubs present. They started classes at Garden Creek School, with the club Shoot'n Stars, under the direction of caller Mark Keays, which saw them graduate in the Spring of 1975.

In 1976, as President Couple, they danced many times a week within the area, which included specials hosted by various clubs: Fredericton Elm Tree Square Dance Club, Harvey Honey Bears, Barkers Point Swingers, Woodstock Wheelers, Estey's Bridge Royal Stars, Saint John Beaus and Belles, Nackawic Headpond Twirlers, Oromocto Pioneers, etc. They went on to be part of the Fredericton Plus and Advance Group, known as the Keays 'Workshoppers, under Mark Keays, until his retirement. They continued to dance using tapes under the direction of Bill Clarke and eventually became known as the ACE Squares. During their time with ACE Squares, they also dabbed a little into Challenge Level Dancing as well, but this was using tapes. A short stint some might say, but always up to the challenge, they continue to dance from Basic to Advance 2 Levels today.

It seems that they could not keep a club caller for with Bill's retirement and move to Sussex, they were fortunate to have Gerry O'Hara form an Advanced Dancing Group, called the Fredericton A Workshoppers, dancing in the Nashwaaksis Arena. They gradually tapered down to one square at Estey's Bridge Recreation Hall.

With the folding of the Shoot'n Stars Club, due to the caller's retirement, and looking to continue their dancing and obtaining more exercise, plus having so many choices, they made the decision to travel to Oromocto to dance on Monday nights, under caller, Gerry O'Hara, which fit their schedule the best. This was in 2003, and they have been very faithful supporters of the club and remain so today. They have served on the club executive as Club Treasurers, first from 2006-2008 and now 2016-2018.

Like many other facets of dance life, this couple would not only dance within the walls or borders of the Fredericton dance scene. They were introduced to the MASDA (Montreal Area Square Dance Association) Annual Convention resulting in three (3) wonderful summer weekends. They attended their first Canadian National Square Dance Convention, in 1978 in Edmonton, and with this summer's attendance in London will make their 10th bi-annual event. They have attended several MCCA conventions as well as, several New England Square and Round Dance conventions.

This couple has danced in the United States and also a London Club in Britain. As for within Canada, they have, so far, managed to dance in 9 of the 10 Canadian provinces.

Presently, this couple dances with the East Coast A's, an advance group with caller, Ron Lowe. They occasionally dance with Washademoak Swingers, Cambridge Narrows. They give of their time and joy of dancing, by attending demos held at Nursing Homes, community events as well as special dances within the area. It can be said, that if there is a dance to be held, one will more than likely see this couple there. Great ambassadors for the activity as whole, you will not find. Where ever they travel, their love of dancing is front and center and always willing to help where they can.



Board of Directors General Bylaw – 6 – Number and Power

6.1 – Affairs of the Federation shall be managed by a board of eight directors who may exercise all powers and do all acts and things which may be exercised or done by the Federation and which are not by the Letters of Patent or bylaws of the Federation or by law expressly directed or required to be done by the Federation at any annual or special general meeting of the members.

General Bylaw - 10 - Term of Office

10.1 – The Director's term of office shall be for two years from the annual meeting at which he or she is elected or until his or her successor are elected. A person appointed by the director then in office shall hold office for the balance of the unexpired term of the board. A maximum of three consecutive terms may be served by any one director.






